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1. Aims

Our school aims to meet its obligations under the Public Sector Equality Duty (PSED) by having due regard to the need to:

- Eliminate discrimination, harassment, victimisation and other conduct that is prohibited by the Equality Act 2010
- > Advance equality of opportunity between people who share a protected characteristic and people who do not share a relevant protected characteristic
- > Foster good relations across all characteristics between people who share a protected characteristic and people who do not share it. The protected characteristics are:
 - Age
 - Disability
 - · Gender reassignment
 - Marriage or civil partnership
 - · Pregnancy and maternity
 - Race
 - · Religion or belief
 - Sex
 - · Sexual orientation

Our school aims to promote respect for difference and diversity in accordance with our values, with every child thriving every day in knowing how to Live ,Love, Learn. Through our Littletown 'L's we are able to promote the culture of the school focusing on aspects such as respect, equality, opportunity and collaboration.

2. Legislation and guidance

This document meets the requirements under the following legislation:

- ➤ The Equality Act 2010, which introduced the Public Sector Equality Duty and protects people from discrimination
- > The Equality Act 2010 (Specific Duties) Regulations 2011, which require we aschools to publish information to demonstrate how they are complying with the Public Sector Equality Duty and to publish equality objectives

This document is also based on Department for Education (DfE) guidance: The Equality Act 2010 and schools, the technical guidance for schools from the Equality and Human Rights Commission and guidance from the Government Equalities Office on meeting the specific duties that support the Public Sector Equality Duty.

This document also complies with our funding agreement and articles of association.

3. Roles and responsibilities

The governing board will:

- > Ensure that the equality information and objectives as set out in this statement are published and communicated throughout the school, including to staff, pupils and parents/carers
- > Ensure that the published equality information is updated at least every year, and that the objectives are reviewed and updated at least every 4 years
- Delegate responsibility for monitoring the achievement of the objectives on a daily basis to the headteacher

The equality link governor will:

- > Meet with the headteacher and/or staff members, to discuss any issues and how these are being addressed
- > Ensure they're familiar with all relevant legislation and the contents of this document
- > Attend appropriate equality and diversity training
- > Report back to the full governing board regarding any issues

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The headteacher will:

- > Promote knowledge and understanding of the equality objectives among staff and pupils
- > Monitor success in achieving the objectives and report back to governors
- > Have "due regard" when making a decision or taking an action to whether it may have particular implications for people with particular protected characteristics
- > Meet with the equality link governor to raise and discuss any issues when necessary
- > identify any staff training needs, and deliver training as necessary

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All school staff are expected to have regard to this document and to work to achieve the objectives as set out in section 8.

4. Eliminating discrimination

The school is aware of its obligations under the Equality Act 2010 and complies with non-discrimination provisions.

Where relevant, our policies include reference to the importance of avoiding discrimination and other prohibited conduct.

Staff and governors are regularly reminded of their responsibilities under the Equality Act – for example, during meetings. Where this has been discussed during a meeting, it is recorded in the meeting minutes.

New staff receive training on the Equality Act as part of their induction, and all staff receive refresher training regularly.

The headteacher, and the equality link governor liaise regarding any issues and make senior leaders and governors aware of these as appropriate.

5. Advancing equality of opportunity

As set out in the DfE guidance on the Equality Act, the school aims to advance equality of opportunity by:

- > Removing or minimising disadvantages suffered by people that are connected to a particular characteristic they have (e.g. pupils with disabilities, or gay pupils who are being subjected to homophobic bullying)
- > Taking steps to meet the particular needs of people who have a particular characteristic
- > Encouraging people who have a particular characteristic to participate fully in any activities (e.g. encouraging all pupils to be involved in the full range of school societies)
- > Analyse attainment data to establish how pupils with different characteristics are performing in order to determine strengths and areas for improvement and implement actions in response.
- > Make evidence available identifying improvements for specific groups (e.g. declines in incidents of homophobic or transphobic bullying)
- > Analyse further data about any issues associated with particular protected characteristics, identifying any issues which could affect our own pupils

6. Fostering good relations

The school aims to foster good relations between those who share a protected characteristic and those who do not share it by:

- > Promoting tolerance, friendship and understanding of a range of religions and cultures through different aspects of our curriculum. This includes teaching in RE, citizenship and personal, social, health and economic (PSHE) education, but also activities in other curriculum areas. For example, as part of teaching and learning in English/reading, pupils will be introduced to literature from a range of cultures
- > Making pupils aware of our behaviour and anti-bullying policies
- > Holding assemblies dealing with relevant issues. Pupils will be encouraged to take a lead in such assemblies, and we will also invite external speakers to contribute
- > Working with our local community. This includes inviting leaders of local faith groups to speak at assemblies, and organising school trips and activities based around the local community
- > Encouraging and implementing initiatives to deal with tensions between different groups of pupils within the school. For example, our school council has representatives from different year groups and is formed of pupils from a range of backgrounds. All pupils are encouraged to participate in the school's activities, such as sports clubs. We also work with parents to promote knowledge and understanding of different cultures
- > We have developed links with people and groups who have specialist knowledge about particular characteristics, which helps inform and develop our approach

7. Equality considerations in decision-making

The school ensures it has due regard to equality considerations whenever significant decisions are made. We consider equality implications before and at the time that we develop policy and make decisions and continue to review these on a continuing basis.

The school always considers the impact of significant decisions on particular groups. For example, when a school trip or activity is being planned, the school considers whether the trip:

- > Cuts across any religious holidays
- > Is accessible to pupils with disabilities
- > Has equivalent facilities for boys and girls

8. Equality objectives

Objective 1

To ensure that our curriculum and teaching is made accessible to all pupils through OAIP, including those with disabilities and special educational needs, to eliminate discrimination and ensure the best possible educational outcomes for all pupils.

Objective 2

To recognise that some parents may face unique challenges (financial hardship, mental health issues, lack of time or resources) and may required support, guidance and signposting to ensure their children attend school ready and able to learn.

Objective 3

To ensure enrichment and out of school activities are made accessible to all pupils, including those with PPG, to eliminate discrimination and ensure the best possible educational outcomes

The progress we are making towards these objective will be reviewed annually and published on our website alongside our Equality Information

9. Monitoring arrangements

The headteacher will update the equality information we publish, at least every year.

School-specific equality objectives will be reviewed by the head teacher at least every 4 years.

Th Equality Information document will be reviewed by the governing board annually, to ensure continued compliance with the PSED.

This policy will be approved by the governing board.
